President's Column

As part of the agenda for the State League Council in May and in recognition of the League's 90th anniversary, each local League was asked to provide a brief recap of our accomplishments since 1995. Here's what I provided - the result of poring over 15 years of local convention work-books:

We're a League, so we do League things – voters service, candidate and ballot measure forums (and the League format is better than anyone else's), and *Voters' Guides* – but we are a big city League, so we deal with big city issues – sometimes to a disheartening degree.

As I reviewed 15 years worth of history, there were some topics that we addressed year after year:

- Police oversight, especially the appropriate use of force;
- Urban renewal policies and the Portland Development Commission, with a focus on how much renewal investment is appropriate, and what is the impact on other taxing districts; and
- Affordable housing and homelessness.

We have observed, we have studied, we have testified repeatedly on these subjects. I wish “they” would listen to us, fix the problems, and let us move on. As a side note, guest speakers for our local conventions have included 3 of the past 5 Police Chiefs – 4 if we count Tom Potter, although he spoke with us when he was Mayor. Despite that record of outreach, we do not have a close relationship with the Police Bureau.

More recently we have been involved in uniquely Portland policy issues – Voter-Owned Elections and lobbying disclosure requirements. In fact, we file a lobbying report with the City every quarter. We are part of a coal-

tion supporting the Voter-Owned Election policy, which will be on the ballot in November 2010.

Since 1995 the Portland League has studied:

- Funding issues for government and schools (multiple times);
- City/County relations, including opportunities for consolidating services;
- The juvenile justice system;
- The county library system;
- Housing issues;
- Neighborhood associations, and
- School equity and excellence (this study is in progress).

Several years ago, we started a practice of revisiting our oldest positions as part of the annual program planning cycle to see which positions need to be reviewed and updated. The practice has been useful in educating our newer members.

Other points of interest on our journey:

- As fundraisers, we have held theater parties (subject to cancellation due to winter snows) and run student elections at Portland State University;
- In the late 1990s we collaborated with KOIN TV (Channel 6) on “Truth Squads” that assessed the truthfulness of campaign ads,
- We started a very popular series of annual “Meet the Press” luncheons, featuring guest speakers from the local media;
- The LWVUS awarded us a substantial American Express grant in 2008 that helped fund a redesign of our webpage to support voters service;
- We hosted visitors from Russia for a week in 2005, and again in 2009, through the Open World Program; and

- Our biggest accomplishment was successfully hosting the LWVUS National Convention in June 2008, with help from Leagues across the state.

We have also been involved in regional issues, especially land use and livability, typically through the special inter-League organization, the League of Women Voters of the Columbia River Region, which also voted this spring to disband. Maybe we can interpret that transition as a sign where “they” did listen to us. The regional government, Metro, seems to be successfully providing policy direction and leadership in solving regional problems.

I'll note some representative data from the past 15 years:

- Our membership has ranged from about 152 in 1997 to 248 in 2007. That high number may be misleading, since about 50 are National Recruited Members, a service that the LWVUS is discontinuing.
- In a city of about 580,000 residents, we have distributed as many as 84,000 *Voters' Guides*, through a local community newspaper. We will never reach that level again, partly because there is so much competition, and partly because we are shifting to on-line delivery.
- The Portland League currently has a budget of about \$57,000, including both a regular fund and an education fund. We support an office and a ½ time office manager (with kudos to Heather Drake for her excellent services.) Our Endowment Fund contributes about \$10,000 each year to the budget.

Burton Considers Oregon State University System at Local Convention

Mike Burton, Vice Provost, School of Extended Studies, Portland State University, spoke to League members at our May 11th Annual Convention. Mike has had an illustrious career in public service, as a legislator, chief executive of Metro and teacher. His position at Portland State is critical to positioning the university to meet the needs of the 21st century, for community and business leaders, innovators, managers and an adaptable, highly skilled workforce. He is also part of the Oregon University System team working to revitalize our higher education system in the face of increasing demands and decreasing revenues.

Mike's remarks made clear that the financial restructuring of our education system brought about by Measure 5 has had ramifications up and down the system, and benefits for students are few.

- It has been predicted that the upcoming generation will have less education than the current one for the first time in our country.

- The four year model of higher education is changing drastically. Portland State's enrollment has more than doubled in 10 years, straining support systems.

- The Oregon University System received 44% less revenue from the state in the 2005-07 biennium than in the 1989-92 period.

- In 1990 Portland State received \$5,500/student from the Oregon University System. In 2009, the amount per student was \$2,777.

Mike reviewed a few points from *The Frohnmayer Report, The Coming Crisis in College Completion – Oregon's Challenge and a Proposal for First Steps*. NOTE: Please Google The Frohnmayer Report to learn more about the future of our university system.

- Mike reported that 18 of the top 30 universities in the world are in the United States and a large number are State Universities that are self-governing, not state agencies as they in Oregon. Ideas for Oregon in the Frohnmayer Report include:

- Separating the University of Oregon from the Oregon University System, and seeding U of O with a substantial state bond.

- Consolidating Portland State University and Oregon State University as one campus, PSU as the teaching university and OSU as the research institution.

- Combining the governance structure of the four regional universities.

- Restructuring the Portland State undergraduate program as a two-year college, dedicated to the third and fourth years. 67% of PSU's students are juniors and seniors.

Mike also discussed the need for more technical education in the university system. Community colleges have been very successful partnering with business and utilities to craft special technology programs and use the skills of retirees to develop the next generation workforce.

This was a great talk. Education will remain at the top of our League program list next year. Thanks to the Board for inviting Mike and keeping us current on this most important topic.

Proud New Citizens Register to Vote

Once each month representatives of the League attend one or two naturalization ceremonies which are held before a judge in the federal courthouse downtown. An average of 75-80 new citizens from around 30 different countries at each ceremony are given the opportunity to fill out voter registration cards.

From February to June, 2010 we have received and turned in 494 registrations from new voters. They are eager for the opportunity and surely will become diligent voters.

In Memoriam

Former Portland League member "Rusty" Goldy passed away May 31, 2010. Rusty was born Nov. 12, 1918, in Erskine, Minnesota. She met her future husband, Daniel L. Goldy during World War II while she was serving as a WAC. After the war, Dan and Rusty moved to Oregon where she earned a Bachelor of Arts in political science from Lewis & Clark College in 1954. Her career included teaching high school, working in politics in Oregon and on Capitol Hill, and serving as executive director of the World Affairs Council of Oregon. Rusty loved the outdoors, particularly camping and hiking in Bend. She was an early trustee and supporter of the High Desert Museum. Dan predeceased Rusty in 2001.

Highlights of June 2010 LWVUS Convention

More than 750 League members (604 delegates, including 11 from Oregon), attended this year's convention in hot, humid Atlanta. In four busy, debate-filled days, the convention approved:

- Not just the Board-recommended study of the "Federal Role in Public Education" but a second study on "Privatization," the policy agenda to transfer government functions, services, and assets to the private sector, recommended by the Seattle League.
- Concurrence statements on Marriage Equality and the National Popular Vote (NPV) Compact. The prior LWVUS study on the NPV compact did not reach consensus, because, as many people argued, the consensus questions did not reflect the right options. The new statement reads: "We support the use of the National Popular Vote Compact as one acceptable way to achieve the goal of the direct popular vote for the election of the president until the abolition of the Electoral College is accomplished."
- An updated Arms Control Position.
- A long list of resolutions urging LWVUS Board action on many topics, including support for safe drilling and mining for energy resources, limiting the use of the Senate filibuster, and advocating for bills that legislate for "improved Medicare" (shorthand for a single-payer health care system).
- A set of changes to the LWVUS bylaws (none of which affect Portland).
- New LWVUS per-member payment (PMP) rates of \$29.70 for 2010-2011 (the LWVUS board originally recommended a rate of \$29.60

– the extra 10 cents is to help cover the cost of the Privatization study) and \$30.00 for 2011-2012.

- The recommended LWVUS budget and slate of officers.

We heard special presentations from Georgia Congressman John Lewis, and the Honorable Kathleen Sebelius, Secretary of Health and Human Services. In keeping with the 90th Anniversary theme, the banquet speaker was Robert Cooney, author of an illustrated history of the American suffrage movement. And on Sunday morning, we heard from a panel of eight former LWVUS presidents who shared peak moments and funny stories from their terms in office. They all urged the League to hold onto its core strengths, to focus on issues of democracy and public policy where we have experience and expertise (and not get distracted by the hot topic of the moment), to promote civility in public discourse, to reach out and invite people in, and to have fun! As these inspiring women told their stories, they said that the League's reputation for having done the homework and mastering the issues is what gave them credibility and influence as they dealt with US and world leaders. "We know what we're talking about!"

In addition to the business sessions, the agenda offered an array of interesting workshops. I attended sessions on the problems with touchscreen voting machines (not a problem for Oregon, thank goodness), using technology to reach the public, and tools for promoting productive public discourse.

Daily information from Convention was distributed to League members across the country by e-mail and is also available from the LWVUS website.

Highlights of May 2010 LWVOR Convention

The State Council, held in alternate years with the LWV of Oregon Convention, handles the business needed for the upcoming year. During Council, attendees:

- Approved the slate of officers, including Portland members Marnie Lonsdale (second Vice President) and Rita Fawcett (who will be helping with Voters Service).
- Approved the Regular Fund budget for 2010-2011, and reviewed the Education Fund budget.
- Participated in a workshop on an "Integrated Water Resources Strategy," sponsored by the State Water Resources Department.

As the Saturday evening entertainment, Heather Drake, Norman Turrill and I, along with a League lifetime member from Deschutes County, and a young member from Umpqua Valley, shared stories about what attracted us to the League – in a multi-generational array. Paula Krane from the Corvallis League, serving as host, asked us questions such as, what did we want to be when we grew up and what got us interested in politics. Heather said she views politics as a tug of war, "if you let go of your end of the rope, the other side wins completely," and I reported that at age 10, I wrote in a school assignment that I wanted to be president of the League of Women Voters. . .

This personalization of membership perspectives carried through to a workshop on Sunday. Oregon League membership has dropped 10 percent from 2008 to 2010 (to a total of 1264 members) so the State Board is focusing on how we can recruit and retain people. They presented scenarios outlining the reasons people give for non-participation and then offering potential rebuttals.
