#### INTRODUCTION

This Nonpartisan Voters' Guide is published and provided free of charge by the League of Women Voters of Oregon. Large print, audio (read aloud), screen-reader accessible (automated) and Spanish Voters' Guides (Guía para Votantes) and more information are posted at our website lwvor.org/vote.

Candidates on the ballot for statewide Oregon offices were contacted by email to answer questions prepared by the League of Women Voters of Oregon. Candidate replies are printed as received, free of edits. Contact lwvor@lwvor. org for more information.

#### POLITICAL PARTY BALLOTS

No voter in Oregon will see all the candidates on their Primary ballot. Voters who are registered as a member of the Democratic Party or the Republican Party will receive a ballot that includes all the candidates for that specific party, along with all eligible nonpartisan contests. Voters not belonging to a political party or to a minor political party will receive a ballot for the Primary Election that includes only eligible nonpartisan contests. If you are not registered with the political party in whose primary you wish to vote, you have until April 26 to change your registration to allow you to vote in that party primary.

#### REDISTRICTING INFORMATION

New congressional and legislative redistricting maps for Oregon were approved in 2021. Elections using these new maps will take place in 2022, with those elected taking their seats in January of 2023. This means it is possible you may now reside in a different US House, or State Legislative district than the last time you voted. Your ballot will be updated with your new district information, and you can find out more information about which district you are in, and who will be on your ballot, by visiting Vote411.org.

## CHECK & UPDATE YOUR VOTER REGISTRATION AND ADDRESS

You can register to vote, check on your registration, or update it online at oregonvotes. org. Click Register to Vote to register to vote. Click My Vote to check or update your registration, including your party affiliation and address. Your address must be correct. Ballots are NOT forwarded.

See oregonvotes.org for contact information of county election officials.

A person who is homeless or who resides where mail service is unavailable can register to have their ballot sent to the office of their county clerk. These voters can pick up their ballot at their county elections office.

If an Oregon resident wishes to register to vote but doesn't feel safe disclosing their home address, they can still register and vote while maintaining their privacy. Visit oregonvotes.org for details.

- April 26th is the last day to register to vote, to select or change your political party registration or to update your mailing address
- April 27th to May 3rd when ballots will be mailed. If you do not receive your ballot by May 7th, contact your county elections office. You can call them at the phone number below.
- May 17th is election day. Ballots must be dropped off at a ballot box by 8pm, or postmarked by May 17th. No postage is required to mail your ballot.



Congress has the responsibility of working with the President to determine how refugees are accepted. Congress does not necessarily need to legislate refugee assimilation, but it does have the authority to. We should take in more refugees, and the entire immigration process should be safely sped up.

There is much more the federal government can do to address the causes of climate change! Our Federal Emergency Management Agency has many of the responsibilities for mitigating the effects of climate change that are already occurring. FEMA's Mitigation Directorate implements a variety of programs that cover potential extreme weather events. FEMA needs significantly more funding, and the federal government must learn from past emergency response failures.

I support the Freedom to Vote Act, the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, and the For the People Act. Although I do pledge to work towards the goal of voting rights for all Americans, I could only assure they are secure after Republicans change their behavior on this issue. The Brennan Center for Justice says 19 states enacted 33 laws in 2021 making it more difficult to vote. This methodology and practice should also be proactive to have solutions before there's a problem. As an example, the age-old practice of grazing in our forest lands will dramatically reduce the underbrush problem which will reduce the fire hazard. But we should not be allowing grazing near stream and bodies of water.

This will be led by the governor & connect all state agencies, organizations, & resources to understand & meet the needs of different populations.

We will evaluate current response time and resources to determine the amount of contracts & resources we need for safety & individual needs. We must re-allocate state funds to ensure disaster response & recovery have all resources needed to tackle the growing disaster season.

Oregon needs an outsider like me with practical life expertise, experience and backbone to address these crises.

Career politicians have failed us by their refusal to address the root causes of homelessness. We have a substance abuse problem, not a housing problem. Oregon is #2 in the country in substance abuse per capita, and #50 in treatment beds. Funds must be reallocated toward low-barrier shelters to clear our streets, and to treatment options for substance abuse and mental health. Take Title IX for example. Professionally, I bring a strong blend of public service and judicial experience to the role. Personally, my own experiences as a first-generation American of mixed ancestry, my legal and community work with persons of limited means and diverse backgrounds, and my ongoing efforts to inform myself about and involve myself in issues related to law and equity, all provide me with with a unique perspective from which to gauge the impact that the court's work has on the public that it serves.

I could not do what I have done for 10 years without having a deep interest in the law itself, without limiting that interest to an area or two. That said, my work as a trial lawyer and circuit court judge have made me keenly aware of the practical impact that the appellate courts' decisions have on the trial courts and their consumers. As an overriding interest, I am very conscious of issues related to access to justice and the need for equal treatment of persons within/without the system.

Through informed practices that focus on early services to families confronting issues related to income disparity, substance abuse, and mental health; sentencing programs that emphasize rehabilitation as much as punishment or retribution; and, relatedly, a juvenile-justice system that has the resources and authority it needs to help ensure that troubled youth can obtain the education, treatment, and support they need to develop into contributing members of our communities.

To help ensure judges are impartial in their duties, the Oregon Code of Judicial Conduct prevents judicial candidates from making pledges, promises or commitments concerning cases, controversies, or issues that are likely to come before their court. Questions from the League of Women Voters and answers by judicial candidates respect and conform to this provision.
